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MAR THOMA SLEEVA IS A SYRIAC TERM WHICH MEANS **SAINT THOMAS CROSS**

The original phrase used is "Cruz de Sam Thome", meaning Cross of St. Thomas. The Mar Thoma Sleva is the dynamic symbol of the death and resurrection of Iso Misiha. It proclaims the Theological, Christological, Pneumatological and Ecclesiological dimensions and specifications of Christian faith.

Mar Thoma Sleva is an empty cross, namely, the cross without the dying figure of *Iso Misiha*. In imitation of the empty tomb, this empty Sleva symbolizes the resurrection of *Iso Misiha*.

The Sleva without the figure of the Lord reveals fully the mystery of salvation. It reveals the three divine persons of the Holy Trinity, the work of creation by the Father, redemption by the Son, sanctification by the Holy Spirit, the Church which is the continuation of Christ, the Word of God which builds up the Church, the sacraments which are the acts of the Church and the final glorification of the Church.

Each of its elements carry symbolic meanings.

The **four edges** of the cross are floral in shape, symbolizing fruition and life from the tree of life.

The **lotus** flower beneath the cross is a symbol of Buddhism and India. The lotus symbolizing Buddhism and the Sleva over it shows that Christianity was established in the land of the Buddha. The lotus flower in which the Sleva is situated can be understood as a cultural integration from Buddhism. Thus, the Sleva erected on a lotus, is a living symbol of faith in the Risen Lord, established in India.

The **three** steps below the Cross represent Golgotha, symbolically referring to the death of Jesus, also the three decks of the Ark and the ascent to Mount Sinai.

Finally, the **dove** above the cross represents the Holy Spirit, the third person of the Holy Trinity. According to the Christian tradition, it is this spirit that raised Jesus from the dead and bestows gifts upon the Church's faithful.

On December 18, the Church of Mar Thoma Nazranes celebrates the feast of the "Miracle of Mar Thoma Sleva/Sliba". The Syriac word Mar Sleva means 'One who is Crucified or the Risen Lord', i.e.; the one who has accomplished human salvation through the death on the cross and the victorious resurrection.

"If, O Christian, you will always take up the Cross of Christ on yourself as a help, then evil shall not come towards you, nor any scourge come near your habitation; for the opposition power seeing it trembles and leaves". (St. Ephrem of Syrian)

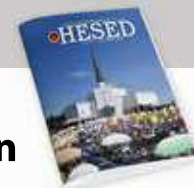
that must inspire us to be merciful and compassionate towards other persons. The cure of humanity can be accomplished only by the human care trusting in Divine Providence.

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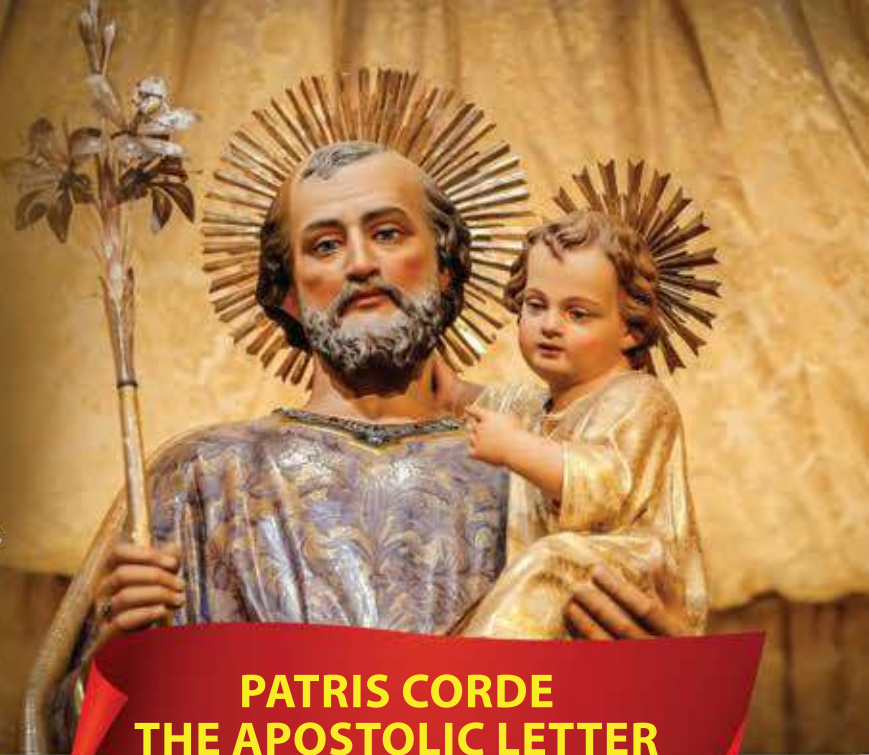

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PATRIS CORDE THE APOSTOLIC LETTER OF THE HOLY FATHER POPE FRANCIS

PATRIS CORDE the Apostolic Letter OF THE HOLY FATHER POPE FRANCIS was promulgated ON THE 150th ANNIVERSARY OF THE PROCLAMATION OF SAINT JOSEPH AS PATRON OF THE UNIVERSAL CHURCH Given in Rome, at Saint John Lateran, on 8 December, Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, in the year 2020, the eighth of Pontificate.

He starts with the following words: WITH A FATHER'S HEART: that is how Joseph loved Jesus, whom all four Gospels refer to as "the son of Joseph". Then he narrates how Joseph is depicted in the Gospels.

We know that Joseph was a lowly carpenter (cf. Mt 13:55), betrothed to Mary (cf. Mt 1:18; Lk 1:27). He was a "just man" (Mt 1:19), ever ready to carry out God's will as revealed to him in the Law (cf. Lk 2:22.27.39) and through four dreams (cf. Mt 1:20; 2:13.19.22).

Blessed Pius IX declared him "Patron of the Catholic Church", Venerable Pius XII proposed him as "Patron of Workers" and Saint John Paul II as "Guardian of the Redeemer". Saint Joseph is universally invoked as the "patron of a happy death".

Now, one hundred and fifty years after his proclamation as Patron of the Catholic Church by Blessed Pius IX (8 December 1870), Pope Francis would like to share some personal reflections on this extraordinary figure, so close to our own human experience. His desire to do so increased during these months of pandemic, when we experienced, amid the crisis, how "our lives are woven together and sustained by ordinary people, people often overlooked. People who do not appear in newspaper and magazine headlines, or on the latest television show, yet in these very days are surely shaping the decisive events of our history. Doctors, nurses, storekeepers and supermarket workers, men and women working to provide essential services and public safety, volunteers, priests, men and women religious, and so very many others. They understood that no one is saved alone... Each of us can discover in Joseph – the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence – an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble. Saint Joseph reminds us that those who appear hidden or in the shadows can play an incomparable role in the history of salvation. A word of recognition and of gratitude is due to them all.

Then Pope Francis reflects on the character of St. Joseph as follows:

1. A beloved father

The greatness of Saint Joseph is that he was the spouse of Mary and the father of Jesus. In this way, he placed himself, in the words of Saint John Chrysostom, "at the service of the entire plan of salvation".

Saint Paul VI pointed out that Joseph concretely expressed his fatherhood "by making his life a sacrificial service to the mystery of the incarnation and its redemptive purpose".

2. A tender and loving father

Joseph saw Jesus grow daily "in wisdom and in years and in divine and human favour" (Lk 2:52). As the Lord had done with Israel, so Joseph did with Jesus: he taught him to walk, taking him by the hand; he was for him like a father who raises an infant to his cheeks, bending down to him and feeding him (cf. Hos 11:3-4).

Since this is part of the entire economy of salvation, we must learn to look upon our weaknesses with tender mercy.

The evil one makes us see and condemn our frailty, whereas the Spirit brings it to light with tender love. Tenderness is the best way to touch the frailty within us. Pointing fingers and judging others are frequently signs of an inability to accept our own weaknesses, our own frailty. Only tender love will save us from the snares of the accuser (cf. Rev 12:10).

Joseph, teaches us that faith in God includes believing that he can work even through our fears, our frailties and our weaknesses. He also teaches us that amid the tempests of life, we must never be afraid to let the Lord steer our course.

3. An obedient father

In every situation, Joseph declared his own "fiat", like those of Mary at the Annunciation and Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane.

4. An accepting father

Joseph accepted Mary unconditionally. He makes a decision to protect Mary's good name, her dignity and her life. Often in life, things happen whose meaning we do not understand. Our first reaction is frequently one of disappointment and rebellion. Joseph set aside his own ideas in order to accept the course of events and, mysterious as they seemed, to embrace them, take responsibility for them and make them part of his own history. Unless we are reconciled with our own history, we will be unable to take a single step forward, for we will always remain hostage to our expectations and the disappointments that follow.

In our own lives, acceptance and welcome can be an expression of the Holy Spirit's gift of fortitude. Only the Lord can give us the strength needed to accept life as it is, with all its contradictions, frustrations and disappointments.

God can make flowers spring up from stony ground. Even if our heart condemns us, "God is greater than our hearts, and he knows everything" (1 Jn 3:20).

Joseph's attitude encourages us to accept and welcome others as they are, without exception, and to show special concern for the weak, for God chooses what is weak (cf. 1 Cor 1:27).

5. A creatively courageous father

If the first stage of all true interior healing is to accept our personal history and embrace even the things in life that we did not choose, we must now add another important element: creative courage.

God acted by trusting in Joseph's creative courage. Arriving in Bethlehem and finding no lodging where Mary could give birth, Joseph took a stable and, as best he could, turned it into a welcoming home for the Son of God come into the world (cf. Lk 2:6-7). Faced with imminent danger from Herod, who wanted to kill the child, Joseph was warned once again in a dream to protect the child, and rose in the middle of the night to prepare the flight into Egypt (cf. Mt 2:13-14).

God always finds a way to save us, provided we show the same creative courage as the carpenter of Nazareth, who was able to turn a problem into a possibility by trusting always in divine providence.

The Gospel does not tell us how long Mary, Joseph and the child remained in Egypt. Yet they certainly needed to eat, to find a home and employment. It does not take much imagination to fill in those details. The Holy Family had to face concrete problems like every other family, like so many of our migrant brothers and sisters who, today too, risk their lives to escape misfortune and hunger. In this regard, I consider Saint Joseph the special patron of all those forced to leave their native lands because of war, hatred, persecution and poverty.

From Saint Joseph, we must learn that same care and responsibility. We must learn to love the child and his mother, to love the sacraments and charity, to love the Church and the poor. Each of these realities is always the child and his mother.



6. A working father

Saint Joseph was a carpenter who earned an honest living to provide for his family. From him, Jesus learned the value, the dignity and the joy of what it means to eat bread that is the fruit of one's own labour.

Work is a means of participating in the work of salvation, an opportunity to hasten the coming of the Kingdom, to develop our talents and abilities, and to put them at the service of society and fraternal communion. Working persons, whatever their job may be, are cooperating with God himself, and in some way become creators of the world around us.

7. A father in the shadows

In his relationship to Jesus, Joseph was the earthly shadow of the heavenly Father: he watched over him and protected him, never leaving him to go his own way. Fathers are not born, but made. A man does not become a father simply by bringing a child into the world, but by taking up the responsibility to care for that child. Whenever a man accepts responsibility for the life of another, in some way he becomes a father to that person.

Being a father entails introducing children to life and reality. Not holding them back, being overprotective or possessive, but rather making them capable of deciding for themselves, enjoying freedom and exploring new possibilities. Chastity is freedom from possessiveness in every sphere of one's life. Joseph did not think of himself, but focused instead on the lives of Mary and Jesus.

In him, we never see frustration but only trust. His patient silence was the prelude to concrete expressions of trust.

A Father becomes like Joseph, only when he always knows that his child was not his own but had merely been entrusted to his care.

The aim of this Apostolic Letter is to increase our love for this great saint, to encourage us to implore his intercession and to imitate his virtues and his zeal.

The saints help all the faithful "to strive for the holiness and the perfection of their particular state of life". Their lives are concrete proof that it is possible to put the Gospel into practice.

Hail, Guardian of the Redeemer,
Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary.
To you God entrusted his only Son;
in you Mary placed her trust;
with you Christ became man.
Blessed Joseph, to us too,
show yourself a father
and guide us in the path of life.
Obtain for us grace, mercy and courage,
and defend us from every evil. Amen





A LIFE COMMITTED TO CHRIST AND HIS CHURCH MAR ALENCHERRY® 75

Mar George Cardinal Alencherry is the first Major Archbishop being elected by the Synod of Bishops of the Syro-Malabar Church and confirmed by Pope Benedict XVI while his predecessors being appointed directly by the Apostolic See. He was created a cardinal of the Catholic Church on 18 February 2012 by Pope Benedict XVI. He was the first bishop of Thuckalay from 1997 to 2011.

Upon the enthronement as the Major Archbishop of the Syro-Malabar Church, he said that his services would be for all the people of India. He stressed on various aspects of Indian belief situations viz., inter-rite relations, inter-faith harmony and ecumenism. On 24 April 2012, Mar Alencherry was made a member of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, and a member of the Congregation for the Oriental Catholic Churches.

As the President of Kerala Catholic Bishop's Conference (KCBC), he has taken a firm decision to make all Catholic hospitals open and available for the treatment of Covid-19 patients. This decision was well acclaimed by Chief Minister of Kerala and Prime Minister of India.

His intervention helped to resolve the issue of pastoral care for the Syro-Malabar Faithful and the Missionary role of the Syro-Malabar Church in the whole of India to some extent and with this intention Pope Francis created the Eparchy of Shamshabad to encompass all the areas of India not included within the jurisdiction of an existing eparchy in October 2017.

At the ecumenical level His Beatitude thinks that, from the documents and statements subsequent to the time of the Council of Chalcedon, there would be a possibility of dialogue and agreement on the Petrine ministry. This is because there remains the imprint of *primus inter pares*. We all need a Petrine ministry of unity, which is a reference for all the Churches. He hopes that a halfway point is found where the Catholic Church and the Orthodox Churches could come together in full communion with the Church of Christ.

At the age of 75, this eminent Cardinal of the Holy Church and the Father and Head of the Syro-Malabar Church gave vital contributions to the Syro-Malabar Church by being its Leader restoring its identity: to the Catholic Church of Kerala comprising of Latin, Syro-Malankara and Syro-Malabar Churches by being the President of Kerala Catholic Bishops' Council, to the Catholic Church of India in the Pastoral care of Migrants, Inter-Faith relations and Mission ad gentes; and to the Universal Church by being the member of the different commissions, councils and dicasteries.

Syro-Malabar Church in Dublin extends our sincere wishes to Mar George Cardinal Alencherry. Let God's blessings be upon all your holy and human endeavours.

THANK YOU ARCHBISHOP DIARMUID MARTIN

Archbishop Diarmuid Martin will be remembered in the history of the Syro-Malabar Church as one of the shepherds who knew how to give pastoral care for the migrants by welcoming, protecting, promoting and integrating them. He knew the heart of the migrants especially the Syro-Malabar migrants, as he has seen the pains and panics, fret and frustrations, the trials and tribulations of this community during his long diplomatic career in different countries. Since his appointment as Archbishop his welcoming and cordial approach to the Syro-Malabar Church has given great hope and profound optimism for the bishops, priests, religious and faithful of the Syro-Malabar Church.

Archbishop Diarmuid Martin has shown great interest and deep commitment to the pastoral care of the Syro-Malabar Catholic Faithful in Ireland as envisaged by the laws and norms of the Catholic Church by accommodating three priests for the pastoral care in 9 mass centres having more than 1000 families and by providing a pastoral centre (priests' residence) and churches for spiritual and liturgical needs.

His appreciation and vision regarding the Syro-Malabar Church is well mentioned in his reflections given at the Pontifical Oriental Institute in Rome on 9 October 2019. "The Syro-Malabar Community in Ireland finds itself therefore as a community with strong religious roots and practice living in a different culture. The Irish Syro-Malabar community is recent in its origins. Of the 106 Syro-Malabar Qurbana Centres in Europe, 39 are in Ireland. The community in Ireland is a stable one where many families have bought their own houses and are settled in significant employment, especially in the health care and information technology domains. They are now moving into their second generation. The presence of the Syro-Malabar Church is marked by intense pastoral and catechetical activity. In addition to regular Sunday catechesis, there are various ecclesial movements and family units. The presence of the Syro-Malabar community in Dublin is clearly an enrichment of the life of the Church. The efforts of regular catechesis of children, the dedication of the priests who reach out to their faithful, the dignity of the liturgies are all things that challenge the Latin Rite Church in Dublin to become a more effective witness to the person and the teaching of Jesus Christ in our contemporary Society."

On this propitious occasion we extend our sincere appreciation for what you have been to us. May good Lord bless you in the coming years with health and happiness.

The Syro-Malabar Church in Dublin gladly welcomes the Archbishop-Elect Dermot Farrell. His experience in different realms of ecclesial ministry as a curate in Mullingar, Director of Formation for the Pontifical Irish College, President of the revision of the formation programme Pastores Dabo Vobis at St Patrick's, Supervisor of the renovation of its heritage buildings, Vice President of St. Patrick's College in Maynooth from 1993 to 1996, President from 1996 to 2007, Parish Priest of Dunboyne, in the Diocese of Meath, Vicar-General of the diocese, Bishop of Ossory since 2018, Member of the standing committee of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference and Conference's finance secretary in March 2019 will be very positive towards the integral formation of the people of God in Dublin. Some information we received through his recent interview imprint in us an impressive erudition of the role of the parents in handing down of our faith to the posterity and of defining of the Christian faith in a meaningful and practical way. He said, "Women have almost preserved the faith in the church, certainly in this country and probably beyond. They were the ones who handed on the faith or took the responsibility for handing it on. Our mothers were very important in terms of teaching and prayer. They were the ones, more than the fathers. That's where a lot of us got our faith, we got it from our parents. Personally, it came from my mother and father. I didn't learn it." "You learned catechism in school, but catechism was not the faith. Faith is a relationship with the Lord." Hope his wisdom from research in the realm of moral theology on Christian Morality as a Sacramental Way of Life would help the people of God to respond to the call of God's initiative with responsibility and sacramentality.

BISHOP STEPHEN CHIRAPPANATH

On 28 July 2016 during the Jubilee Year of Mercy, Pope Francis nominated Stephen Chirappanath, Titular Bishop of Slebte and Apostolic Visitator for the Syro-Malabar Faithful in Europe. In the letter of appointment, Pope clearly stated that the Apostolic Visitator is appointed because of his concern for the needs of the flock of the Syro-Malabar Faithful a great number of whom, living in the European region, lack a leader for their spiritual needs. Pope Francis wished in the following words: "We wish that you should advise the Syro-Malabar clergy and people living in Europe of this our Decree, and we urge these same persons that they, fulfilling the will of Christ with a sincere heart should consider you as a father to be loved and a guardian to be honoured". [Pope Francis, Letter of Appointment, dated 28 July 2016]. The Apostolic Visitator Mar Stephen Chirappanath was ordained bishop on 1st November 2016 at the Basilica of Saint Paul Outside the Walls. His Beatitude George Cardinal Alencherry, Major Archbishop of Ernakulam - Angamaly (Syro-Malabar Church) was



the Principal Consecrator and His Eminence Leonardo Cardinal Sandri, Prefect of the Congregation for the Oriental Churches and Mar Pauly Kannookadan, Bishop of Irinjalakuda (Syro-Malabar) were Principal Co-Consecrators. The ceremony of the commissioning of the office of the

Apostolic Visitator took place immediately after the episcopal ordination officiated by His Eminence Leonardo, Cardinal Sandri, the Prefect of the Congregation for the Oriental Churches. As Apostolic Visitator, he carries out his function in accordance with the procedure laid down ad hoc by his decree of appointment. As a rule, he verifies the state and needs of the faithful, encouraging them, meeting with the local bishops, and making a report with proposals to the Congregation for the Eastern Churches. In territories of Europe where the Syro-Malabar faithful do not possess their own hierarchy, the Holy See showed its solicitude towards our faithful through appointing the Apostolic Visitator.

Presently there are 109 Parishes/Holy Qurbana Centres/Missions in Europe of which 41 are in Ireland and 9 are in Dublin. 33 priests are working in 14 countries (Austria, Belgium, France Germany, Holland, Ireland, Italy, Malta, Spain, Scandinavian Countries viz., Norway, Finland and Sweden; and Switzerland) of Europe.

THE CANONIZATION CEREMONY OF ST. MARIAM THRESIA SUNDAY 13 OCTOBER 2019

Sister Mariam Thresia, foundress of the Congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Family, was declared a saint by Pope Francis at a grand ceremony at the Vatican City on Sunday, 13th October 2019 at 10:30 am.

Pope Francis presided over the Rite of Canonization and the celebration of the Holy Eucharist in St. Peter's Square. Mar Pauly Kannookadan the Bishop of Irinjalakuda joined Pope Francis at the altar. Along with four other Blesseds Bl. Giussepina Vannini (1859-1911), foundress of the Daughters of St. Camillus; Dulce Lopes Pontes (1914-1992), Cardinal John Henry Newman, and Margherita Bays (1815-1879), Pope Francis canonized Blessed Mariam Thresia in the Catholic Church. Before the official ceremony of canonization our choir sang a Malayalam song on Mariam Thresia. The ceremony began with the reading of brief biographies of the five persons by Cardinal Giovanni Angelo Becciu, the Prefect of the Congregation for the Cause of Saints, who then requested the Pope to declare them saints. Then, the Sistine Choir led the singing the Litany of the Saints after which Pope Francis



read the solemn formula of Canonization naming the five Blesseds and said, "We declare and define them to be saints and we enroll them among the saints, decreeing that they are to be venerated as such by the whole Church." Pope Francis in his homily commented on the Gospel that focused on how Jesus cured ten lepers but only one came back to thank Him. He spoke of the three phases of the journey of faith, "to cry out, to walk and to give thanks" explaining parable of the leper who came back to Jesus and thanked Him for the healing (Lk 17:19). Pope said

"Today we give thanks to the Lord for our new saints. They walked by faith and now we invoke their intercession, three of them were religious women; they show us that the consecrated life is a journey of love at the existential peripheries of the world." According to Vatican authorities, there were about 50,000 people present in St. Peter's Square from different continents including 50 cardinals, 3000 priests and official delegations from the home countries of the five new saints.

On the eve of canonization there was a solemn vigil service in the Basilica of Santa Maria Maggiore, the Marian Basilica in Rome from 4pm- 5pm. The presence of various dignitaries namely Cardinal Giovanni Angelo Becciu, Archbishop Mar Andrews Thazhath and Mar Stephen Chirappanath. Rev. Dr. Fr. Clement Padathiparambil, Honorable Justice Kurian Joseph, Rev. Sr. Udaya CHF, Superior General and Rev. Sr. Bhavya CHF, General Counsellor of the Congregation of Holy Family enriched this spiritual preparation.

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THE HOLY CATHOLIC CHURCH : COMMUNION OF DIFFERENT INDIVIDUAL CHURCHES

The Catholic Church holds in high esteem the Institutions, Liturgical Rites, Ecclesiastical Traditions and the established standards of the Christian life of the Eastern Churches. These Churches are distinguished as they are for their venerable antiquity, there remains conspicuous the Tradition that has been handed down from the Apostles through the Fathers and that forms part of the divinely revealed and undivided heritage of the universal Church.

There are 24 autonomous churches in the one Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church viz., one Latin Church and twenty-three Eastern Catholic Churches, a distinction by now more historical than geographical. The term *sui iuris* means, literally, "of its own law", or self-governing. Syro-Malabar Church is one among them.

The Holy Catholic Church, which is the Mystical Body of Christ, is made up of the faithful who are organically united in the Holy Spirit by the same faith, the same sacraments and the same government and who, combining together into various groups which are held together by a hierarchy, form separate Churches or Rites. It is the mind of the Catholic Church that each Individual Church or Rite should retain its Traditions whole and entire and likewise that it should adapt its way of life to the different needs of time and place.

These Individual Churches, differ somewhat among themselves in rite (to use the current phrase), that is, in liturgy, ecclesiastical discipline, and spiritual heritage. Therefore, means should be taken in every part of the world for the protection and advancement of all the individual Churches and, to this end, there should be established parishes and a special hierarchy where the spiritual good of the faithful demands it. There are personal Parishes, Missions, Apostolic Visitations, Exarchates, and Eparchies etc. outside the proper territories of all self-governed churches, due to this reason.

All members of the Eastern Rite should know and be convinced that they can and should always preserve their legitimate Liturgical Rite and their established way of life, and that these may not be altered except to obtain for themselves an organic improvement. They should attain to an ever-greater knowledge and a more exact use of them, and, if in their regard they have fallen short owing to contingencies of times and persons, they should take steps to return to their ancestral traditions.

Those who, by reason of their office or apostolic ministries, are in frequent communication with the Eastern Churches or their faithful should be instructed according as their office demands in the knowledge and veneration of the rites, discipline, doctrine, history and character of the members of the Eastern Rites.

The Major Archbishop with its synod is the highest authority for all affairs of the in the Major Archiepiscopal Church, including the right of establishing new eparchies and of nominating bishops of their rite within the territorial boundaries of the Church.

The Sacred Ecumenical Council ardently desires that new patriarchates should be erected where there is need, to be established either by an ecumenical council or by the Roman Pontiff. This holds good in the case of Syro-Malabar Church which is presently a Major Archiepiscopal Church which could be raised to the status of a patriarchate which has all the reasons taking into consideration its antiquity, continuity of venerable traditions and heritage.

The faithful are bound to take part on Sundays and feast days in the Divine Liturgy or, according to the regulations or custom of their own rite, in the celebration of the Divine Office. The faithful are earnestly exhorted to receive Holy Communion on these days, and indeed more frequently-yes, even daily.



CATHOLIC CHURCH



The distinctive four Marks of the Church are One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic" expressed in the Niceno-Constantinopolitan Creed completed at the First Council of Constantinople in AD 381 "We believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church."

One

"There is one body and one Spirit just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all." (Ephesians 4:5-6). Elsewhere, St. Paul the Apostle says: "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Gal. 3:28).

Holy

The word 'holy' means set apart for a special purpose by and for God. Christians understand that the holiness of the universal Church has derived from Christ's holiness. God has called us to be holy and blameless. Saints by their lives witness to this fact. Church is sanctified through the sacraments.

Catholic

The word 'catholic' is derived from the Greek adjective καθολικός (katholikos), meaning "general", "universal". Applied to the church, the qualification "catholic" means that in the church the wholeness of the Christian faith, full and complete, all-embracing, and with nothing lacking, is proclaimed to all people without excluding any part of the faith or any class or group of people. The adjective can be applied not only to the church as spread throughout the world but also to each local manifestation of the church, in each of which nothing essential is lacking for it to be the genuine Church of Christ.

Apostolic

This describes the Church's foundation and beliefs as rooted and continuing in the living Tradition of the Apostles of Jesus.

SYRO MALABAR CATHOLIC CHURCH

The Syro-Malabar Catholic Church is one of the 22 Eastern (Oriental) Catholic Churches in full communion with Rome. It is the second largest Eastern Catholic Church after the Ukrainian Church and the largest of the Saint Thomas Christian (Nazrani) denominations with 4.6 million believers. It is a sui juris Church governed by the Synod of Bishops headed by the Major Archbishop. The Syro-Malabar Church, with its deep-rooted spirituality and high rate of vocations to priesthood and religious life, can be considered as the most vibrant Catholic community in the world.

The St. Thomas Christians (Nazranis)

The Syro-Malabar Church is an Apostolic Church which traces its origin to St. Thomas, the Apostle, who landed at Cranganore (Muziris) in 52 AD and founded seven Christian communities in Kerala, at Palayur, Cranganore, Kokkamangalam, Kottakavu (Parur), Quilon, Niranam, and Chayal. St. Thomas was martyred in A.D. 72 at Mylapore, near Chennai/Madras. The early Christian community in India was known as St. Thomas Christians. They were also called Nazranis, meaning those who follow the path of Jesus of Nazareth.

The East Syrian (Chaldean) Connection

From early centuries, the Church of St. Thomas Christians came into contact with the East Syrian Church, which also traces its origin to Apostle Thomas. From the 4th century until the end of the 16th century Thomas Christians were governed by Bishops who were appointed and sent by the Patriarch of the East Syrian Church. The Thomas Christians developed a unique system of ecclesiastical administration with the Bishops from Persia in charge of liturgical and spiritual matters and the local Archdeacon of All India (A priest) heading the Christian community and handling the administration of the Church through Palliyogam (early form of Synod). Thus the Thomas Christians shared the liturgical, theological, spiritual and other ecclesiastical traditions with the East Syrian Church; in socio-cultural organization and practices, however, they were distinctively Indian.

The Arrival of Portuguese and the Influence of the Latin Church

The arrival of the Portuguese in the 16th Century marks a new era in the life of the Thomas Christians. East Syrian Bishops stopped coming. Archdeacon lost his position and Latin Prelates exercised full authority over ecclesiastical

administration for almost three centuries. This paved way for the Latinization of liturgy and ecclesiastical administration. Following the Coonan Cross oath in 1653 and the introduction of the Padroado (the Portuguese jurisdiction under the Propaganda Congregation) in 1661, the Thomas Christians got divided into two groups, of which the group who resisted Latin rule formed a separate community under the Archdeacon. Later they accepted the West Syrian theological and liturgical tradition of the West Syrian Orthodox Church of Antioch and came to be known as the Jacobite Church. They were further divided into several independent Churches. The group that remained faithful to Rome came to be known as Syro-Malabar Church, a name which became a common epithet only in the nineteenth century. It literally means Syrian Christians of the Malabar Coast (Kerala).

The Syro-Malabar Church

In 1886 the Padroado jurisdiction over the whole Malabar (Kerala) was suppressed and in 1887 Pope Leo XIII re-organized the Syro-Malabar Catholics into two independent Vicariates of Kottayam and Trissur. Finally, the Syro-Malabar Church obtained bishops of their own rites and nationality in 1896, when they were further reorganized into three vicariates of Trissur, Changanacherry and Ernakulam by Pope Leo XIII through his Brief Quae rei Sacrae. Later, the Syro-Malabar Hierarchy was established on December 21, 1923, by the Apostolic Constitution Romani Pontifices of Pope Pius XI (Acta Apostolicae Sedis, 16 [1924], pp. 257-262), with Ernakulam as the Metropolitan See and Trichur, Changanacherry and Kottayam (established in 1911 for the Southists) as suffragans. In 1956 Changanacherry was raised to the status of a Metropolitan See, with Pala as a suffragan diocese.

The restoration of the hierarchy initiated a process of liturgical reform that sought to restore the oriental identity of the Latinized Syro-Malabar rite, which was approved by Pius XII in 1957 and introduced in 1962. In subsequent years several new dioceses were established both within and outside Kerala. From 1962, the Church began to set up mission centers in North India, which later became dioceses. Last 40 years have been a period of steady growth for the Syro-Malabar Church.

The Syro-Malabar Major Archiepiscopal Church

On December 16, 1992, Pope John Paul II, by the Apostolic Constitution Quae maiori (Acta Apostolicae Sedis, 85[1993], pp. 398-399), raised the Syro-Malabar Church to the status of Major Archiepiscopal sui iuris Church with the title of Ernakulam-Angamaly. Mar Antony Paidyara, the then Metropolitan of Ernakulam was appointed its First Major Archbishop with Mar Abraham Kattumana as the Pontifical Delegate who discharged the duties of the Major Archbishop. Archbishop Kattumana died unexpectedly during his visit to Rome in April 1995 and Mar Padiyara was given the powers of the Major Archbishop. In November 1996 Cardinal Padiyara resigned from his office as Major Archbishop. In his place Archbishop Varkey Vithayathil, C.Ss.R. was appointed as the Apostolic Administrator. In December 1998 he was appointed Major Archbishop by the Pope. In February 2001 Archbishop Vithayathil was created a Cardinal by Pope John Paul II. In 2004, the Holy See granted full administrative powers to the Syro-Malabar Church, including the power to elect bishops.

Major Archbishop Varkey Cardinal Vithayathil passed away on April 1, 2011. On 24 May 2011 Mar George Alencherry was elected Major Archbishop. Pope Benedict XVI confirmed the election on 25 May 2011. He is the first head of the Syro-Malabar Church to be elected by its Synod. On February 18, 2012 Major Archbishop George Alencherry was made Cardinal and a member of the Consistory.



'SYRO-MALABAR HOLY QURBANA'

1. In the Syro-Malabar Holy Qurbana (Mass) the Christ event that is Jesus' Birth, public ministry, passion, death and resurrection is enacted through the signs. But this Christ event is not enacted chronologically in the Syro-Malabar Qurbana.
2. Haikkala: The place where people of God stand. It denotes the earth. Kesthroma: the place where the Choir stand.
3. Madbaha: The place where priest and the altar servers stand. It denotes heaven. Sometimes it denotes the garden where Jesus buried.
4. Altar: it is the throne of God and His tomb.
5. Priest who celebrates the Mass represents Jesus.
6. In the Catholic Church there are two priesthood: Common Priesthood: Through the Sacrament of Baptism and Chrismation (confirmation) all share in the common priesthood of Jesus Christ. Ministerial Priesthood: From the Common priesthood certain people after a period of formation becomes priest through the imposition of hands by the Bishops who are successors of apostles.
7. Those who are serving the altar represents Angels.
8. The community that joins the Holy Eucharist represents the heavenly worshipping community.
9. The first garment the priest wear is the Kothena denotes the new man. This reminds us that the priest and the community who participates in the liturgy should be new people of God.
10. The URARA is worn over KOTHEENA denotes holiness. All the persons who are celebrating liturgy should be holy.
11. The Girdle/sash is known as Soonara. It denotes purity. All have to observe purity who are participating in the mass.
12. The big vestment that is worn over is called KAAPPA. It is the rob of justice.
13. The standing posture denotes the risen people.
14. Kneeling down denotes repentance and the request for help.
15. Incensing denotes that we are removed of the stains of sins and, our prayers are surged into the presence of the Lord. Our sins are burned in the fire of love of Jesus.

I. Opening Ministry

16. Right side is the symbol of light and left side is the symbol of darkness (Mt 25: 33)
17. Until the year 1599 AD (Synod of Diamper) Syro-Malabar Faithful used to make the sign of cross, from right to left, which means that let the Light of Holiness remove our darkness of sins. Later people used to make the Sign of the Cross from left to right praying, kindly lead us from the darkness of sins to the light of holiness.
18. The Beginning prayer (Annapesaha = on the day of Passover (Luke 22:19)) - We remember the last Passover celebrated by Jesus at the cenacle and the commandment he gave us to celebrate in memory of his love towards us.
19. Gloria or Athyunathamam = Glory to God in the highest (Luke 2:14) - We remember the Gloria sung by the angels and recall the birth of Jesus Our Father in Heaven or Swargasthanaya Pithave:
20. (Galatian 4:6 and Romans 8:15) - We confess that we are the children of God and we are sisters and brothers.
21. The meaning of the word Amen which is used all around the world is 'let it be' or 'likewise'.
22. When we say 'peace be with us.' The peace is Jesus. "No Jesus, No peace. Know Jesus, Know peace." St. Paul in his Letter to Ephesians he says HE is our Peace (Eph. 2:14)

23. When we sing *KARTHAVE MAMA RAJAVE* (My Lord and My King) we sing like David the shepherd who believed in the providence of God.
24. Three times the frankincense is put denotes the trinitarian aspect of God.
25. *ARVADHIPANAM KARTHAVE* (Romans 8:11). This is a resurrection hymn. It signifies the resurrection of Jesus and our resurrection after death.

II. Ministry of the Word

26. *SABDAMUYARTHI* (Psalms 19:1-4) we express our joy in singing with the angels the *TRISAGION* (three times holy) it is the joy of the faithful who are going to receive the Word of God.
27. There are four readings in our Liturgy. The first one is from the Book of Laws; the second one from the book of Prophets and the third one is from the letters or epistles. Fourth one is from the New Testament. These readings suggest that the Jesus is the fulfilment of laws and prophets.
28. During the solemn Holy Qurbana the servers hold lit candles on the either side of Bema (like Ambo in Latin Rite) denotes that Jesus, the light of the world has come down to this earth from heaven.
29. Gospel is placed on the right side of the altar. This denotes that Jesus is seated at the right hand of the father.
30. During the readings of the letters and gospel, we hear the Word of God as the people in Israel heard the teachings of Jesus Christ in the valleys and the mountains of Israel.
31. *KAROSUSA*: The meaning of the word is proclamation.
32. It is the response of the people of God to the Word of God.

III. Ministry of Preparation

33. Washing of the hands denotes the need of inner holiness of the priests and the worshipping community.
34. When bread is prepared for offertory in the paten (*PILASA*), it denotes that Jesus is handed over to death into the hands of the Jews.
35. When wine is poured into the chalice (*KASA*) it denotes the bloodshed of Jesus.
36. Water denotes that we are Christians by baptism. Water is the sign of the Christian community.
37. Mixing of water and wine shows that Jesus and we are one, making this offering. Wine denotes Jesus and Water denotes the worshipping community. We also remember what happened at Calvary when one of the soldiers pierced His side with the spear. Water and blood came out from His side.
38. When chalice and paten is taken to the altar, we are reminded of Jesus journey to Calvary carrying the Cross.
39. In Qurbana two offerings are done. First, Jesus continues the sacrifice he has offered to God the Father. Second, I am offered as sacrifice with Jesus. (Hebrew 9:28: Ephesian 5: 2; Romans 12:1).



40. During the time of offertory, the chalice and paten are raised in the manner of the Cross: We remember the death of Jesus on the Cross. Jesus commended himself into the hands of God the Father. We offer ourselves in the chalice and paten completely to God our Father.
41. When Chalice and paten are placed on the Eucharistic table, we remember the burial of Jesus in the tomb.
42. When Chalice and Paten are covered with a Veil (*Sossappa*) we remember the mighty stone with which the tomb of Jesus was covered or sealed.
43. When we sing *Thathanumathupol*, we remember Our Lady, St. Joseph, St. Thomas, saints and martyrs.
44. We receive the true teachings of Jesus Christ through the Sacred Scriptures and the Sacred Traditions. But Christians of first centuries interpreted the Word of God without taking into consideration the Sacred Traditions. So, in the Church many wrong teachings came into existence. Consequently, in the Ecumenical Councils of Nicaea (AD 325) and in the Council of Constantinople (AD 381) the Church Fathers defined the aspects of Creed. Thus, we have the present Creed in the Divine Liturgy.
45. Priest bowing down three times before entering the holy altar shows that Priest is unworthy of celebrating the Eucharist. It is the journey from Earth to Heaven. We are unworthy servants to celebrate the Divine Liturgy.
46. The priest kisses the altar three times in order to attain the worthiness to celebrate the Eucharist.
47. When the priest kisses the altar three times, we pay respect to the Holy Trinity.

IV. ANAPHORA

48. THE PROCESS OF THE TRANSUBSTANTIATION OF BREAD AND WINE INTO THE BODY AND BLOOD of Jesus Christ is continued in the whole Anaphora.



49. In the Syro-Malabar Qurbana presently the Anaphora of Addai and Mari is used. They were the disciples of St. Thomas. They are considered as the proclaimers of the East. Other Anaphoras are also used viz., St. Theodore and Nestorius.
50. In the PranamaJapa (praying by the priest with slightly bowing head position) or Gehantha Cycle; four things are included: 1. Priest praying in silence. 2. Priest requesting the help of the assembly 3. Then the PranamaJapa Proper and the doxology or the concluding thanksgiving.
51. In the first PRANAMAJAPA we thank God the father for the ineffable gifts we have received in our lives. We also request also the grace to celebrate this Eucharist in a befitting manner. This prayer is oriented towards God the Father.
52. Exchange of Peace: The Priest kisses the altar during this ministry. Madbaha or sanctuary is considered as the garden (Golgotha) where Jesus was buried. Altar is the empty tomb. The empty tomb denotes that Jesus is risen. So, when priest kisses the altar, he is proclaiming the peace of the Risen Christ.
53. When we exchange the peace of the Risen Lord, we confess that we have no hatred or enmity among us.
54. The veil or Sossappa when placed surrounding the chalice and paten we are reminded of the cloth or the shroud that was seen in the tomb of Jesus.
55. The second PRANAMAJAPA is oriented towards the Holy Trinity. In this prayer we thank for the great gift of creation and we sing with the choirs of angels in an exultant voice.
56. When we sing HOSSANA we remember the triumphant entry of Christ to Jerusalem (Mark 11:1-10). More than the above said significance the liturgical community sing the hymn with the angels as in the Vision of Prophet Isaiah
57. The third PRANAMAJAPA is oriented towards Christ. In this prayer we thank for the gift of salvation. The Words of Institution: We recall the institution of Holy Eucharist by Jesus Christ on the Last Supper. We also remember the death of Jesus on the Cross.
58. The blood in the chalice and the body in the paten signify the separation of body and blood of Jesus signifies the death of Jesus.

59. Then the priest makes the intercessory prayer for the whole world with hands raised.
60. Fourth PRANAMAJAPA is concentrated on Holy Spirit. In this prayer we thank for the gifts we have received through the working of the Holy Spirit in the Salvation History.
61. When priest makes the Sign of the Cross on the altar and the offerings, we are reminded that the Holy Sacrifice at the Altar and Calvary are one and the same.
62. EPICLESIS - Invocation to the Holy Spirit (John 16:7): We in a special way invite the Holy Spirit to come down upon the Holy Mysteries in order to complete the process of transubstantiation.

V. a. Ministry of Reconciliation

63. "Oh God, have mercy on us". This prayer signifies the reconciliation between man and God. (Psalms 51:1)

VI. Ministry of the Breaking of the Bread

64. When the Sacred Host is broken it denotes the death of Jesus.
65. When the Sacred Host is dipped into Blood it speaks of the unity of the sacred body and sacred blood.
66. When hosts are separated and again joined, we are reminded of the resurrection of Jesus Christ.
67. When the veil or SOSSAPPA is placed in an extended manner on the altar, it denotes that we are invited to participate in the heavenly banquet of Jesus.

V. b. Ministry of Reconciliation

68. When we pray Kalaham Mattaam (Mathew 5:23-24), we are motivated to reconcile among us. Reconciliation between man and man.

VII. Ministry of Reconciliation with God

69. Our Father Prayer: We lost the position of children of God through sin but through the ministry of reconciliation, we regain the privilege of sons and daughters of God. With this dignity we call upon our Heavenly Father.
70. Reception of Holy Communion is inevitable for the participants of Holy Eucharist. Since the Body and blood are united by the gesture precedent, it is natural that we receive communion in one of the species either body or blood.

VIII. Concluding Ministry

71. The final blessing is imparted to receive the grace to lead a life of Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37).
72. Farewell to the Altar VISHUDIKARNATHINTE BALIPEEDAME SWASTHI: This prayer is believed to be formed in the first centuries of Christian era. During the time of persecution, the Faithful were burned in fire, sometimes they were thrown into boiled oil and even they were thrown into the dens of hungry lions. The blood of the martyrs was the nourishment for the growth of the Church tree.



Adieu to Msgr. Antony Perumayan

Msgr. Antony Perumayan, National Coordinator was given a cordial farewell who served the Syro-Malabar Church, Ireland for the past 6 years. While serving as the parish priest of Belfast SMC, he was appointed as the National Coordinator by the Irish Episcopal Conference upon the proposal of His Eminence George Cardinal Alencherry, Head and Father of the Syro-Malabar Church. In the year 2015, he was honoured with the title of Monsignor by the Holy See. He paved the way for the coordination of Syro-Malabar Church, spread in the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland. For the smooth functioning, he established 41 Qurbana Centres in whole Ireland divided into 4 regions (Belfast, Cork, Dublin and Galway). St. Thomas Pastoral Centre a common residence for the priests of Syro-Malabar Church, Dublin was granted by the Archdiocese of Dublin through his sincere effort and genuine intervention. The National Coordination Council thanked Msgr. Antony Perumayan for his great contributions to SMC Ireland at Rialto Pastoral Centre. Bishop Stephen Chirappanath, the Apostolic Visitor, thanked Msgr. Antony for his selfless services. Rev. Dr. Fr. Clement Padathiparambil extended sincere appreciation and gratitude for the meritorious ministry of Msgr. Perumayan for the Syro-Malabar Church in Dublin and offered a token of appreciation on behalf of the present and previous zonal committee members.



Rev. Dr. Clement Padathiparambil, the New National Coordinator of Syro Malabar Catholic Church, Dublin Ireland

Rev. Dr. Clement Padathiparambil is appointed as the new National Coordinator of Syro Malabar Church in Ireland. He is also the Zonal Coordinator of the Syro Malabar Church, Dublin. Bishop Stephen Chirappanath, the Apostolic Visitor of Syro Malabar Faithful in Europe presented the requirement of a National Coordinator for the Syro Malabar Church in Ireland to the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference. The proposal received approval and Archbishop Eamon Martin appointed Fr. Clement Padathiparambil as the National Coordinator. The main responsibility of the Syro Malabar National Coordinator of Ireland is to coordinate the spiritual and ecclesial endeavours of Syro Malabar Church of Northern Ireland and Republic of Ireland. Fr. Clement was appointed to this post upon the return of Msgr. Antony Perumayan to his own native Archdiocese of Ernakulam-Angamaly. Fr. Clement Padathiparambil hails from the Diocese of Irinjalakuda. He is the son of Chirayath Padathiparambil Annie's Teacher and Jose Master from the Parish of Murkanad in the Diocese of Irinjalakuda. He was

ordained to priesthood by Mar James Pazhayattil on 29 December 1998. He had his priestly formation and studies at St. Paul's Seminary Irinjalakuda, St. Thomas Apostolic Seminary, Vadavathoor and Papal Seminary, Pune. He holds doctorate in Canon Law from the Pontifical Oriental Institute, Rome. From 2009-2017, he has been working as Secretary to Bishop, Mar James Pazhayattil, the first bishop of Irinjalakuda. He served in different capacities as Vice Chancellor, Chancellor, Adjutant Judicial Vicar, Diocesan Liturgical Director, Director of Choir, Editor of Diocesan Bulletin, Secretary to the Mercy Trust, Convenor of Mar Thoma Theerthadanam (pilgrimage) Committee, Director of Catholic Labour Movement and Sacristans' Fellowship, Defender of Major Archiepiscopal Tribunal, Visiting Professor of Canon Law at St. Joseph's Pontifical Seminary, Aluva during his tenure of ministry in the Bishop's House, Irinjalakuda. Previously he served as the Vice Rector and Prefect of the Diocesan Minor Seminary. He was also the Director of Altar Boys' Association and Director of Vocation Promotion. He is well known for his canonical precision and ecclesial knowledge. He speaks English, Italian, German, and has working knowledge in French, Spanish and ecclesiastical Latin.



SYRO-MALABAR PROCURA IN ROME

The Code of Canons of the Eastern Churches promulgated in 1990 contemplates such an office of procurator in canon 61: "A Patriarch can have a procurator at the Apostolic See appointed personally by him with the prior assent of the Roman Pontiff."

The statutes approved by the Major Archbishop and accepted by the Oriental Congregation make the following observation about the Procura: The Procura of the Syro-Malabar Catholic Church at the Apostolic See is an ecclesiastical juridical person according to the Code of Canons of the Eastern Churches (CCEO), Can. 920-923. The goal of the Procura is to facilitate the communication of the Major Archbishop with the Apostolic See and to provide, in the name of the Major Archbishop, more expeditiously and with greater effectiveness, for the care of the spiritual and material goods of the Syro-Malabar Catholic Church in Rome and, in general, in Italy. The Procurator also represents the Major Archbishop of the Syro-Malabar Catholic Church before ecclesiastical and civil authorities in Italy. Bishop Stephen Chirappanath is the present procurator. The name of our Procura is "Domus Mar Thoma" (Casa Mar Thoma). Via degli Estensi 137, in Rome.



A Gift from the Holy See to the Syro-Malabar Church - Basilica of Santa Anastasia for the Pastoral Care of the Syro-Malabar Faithful in Rome.

Through the decree of the Vicar General of His Holiness Pope Francis, His Eminence Angelo Cardinal De Donatis, the Syro-Malabar Church was granted the Basilica of Santa Anastasia for the pastoral care of the Syro-Malabar Migrants in Rome. Santa Anastasia Minor Basilica in Rome, one of the oldest Christian churches, and one of the oldest Minor Basilicas in the world was assigned to Syro-Malabar Church. It was Emperor Constantine who started the construction of this Basilica during the years between 325-326 A.D. Until the end of the 7th Century Popes celebrated their Christmas Masses in this Basilica. St. Jerome is said to have preached in this Basilica which is situated near the Colosseum on the Palatine hills which is known to be the epicentre of Roman Empire. St. Jerome himself have brought relics from the Holy Land and deposited in this Basilica. The Church seen today is of 17th Century construction. Until 17th Century, Popes administered the liturgical services of Ash-Wednesday from this Basilica and thereafter it was transferred to the Church of Santa Sabina. The First Perpetual Adoration started here in this Church. This church built in the baroque style is famous for its architectural splendour and decorative works. It was in this church that the Syro-Malabar Catholics of the Santhom Parish Rome were holding their sacramental celebrations from the year 2011. It was in 2019, the Syro-Malabar bishops made a request to the Holy Father Pope Francis during their ad Limina visit for obtaining a house of worship for their spiritual and pastoral needs. With this decree, Santa Anastasia Minor Basilica has become the centre of pastoral care of around 7,000 Syro-Malabar Catholics living in and around Rome. The concerted efforts of Mar Stephen Chirappanath, the priests working in Rome and the people of God in Rome paved the way for the speedy implementation of this request.



“Help the children to grow gathering around the Eucharistic Table”, Bishop Stephen Chirappanath.

“Those parents who help the children to grow in relating with the Eucharistic table will never be unhappy in their lives”, spoke Bishop Stephen while he was having a colloquium with parish committee members of the nine Holy Qurbana centres of Syro-Malabar Church, Dublin. Faith formation should start from the families. Liturgy is the best way of catechesis. The vocation arises from the families where parents kneel down and pray. Bishop Stephen was very confident that in the coming future there will be good number of vocations from Syro-Malabar Catholic families in Ireland who are strong in divine faith and ecclesial love. Bishop Chirappanath commented that if children want to grow in their own faith and traditions, there should be opportunities for children to interact among their own communities. Frequent Divine Liturgy, catechism classes and retreats will provide more opportunities for such interactions. The ministry of the church by the laity is a vocation. Those who are entrusted with the ecclesial duties are to protect common good and the will of God, and not their own likes and desires; Bishop exhorted. Later the Newsletter of the Syro-Malabar Church ‘Hesed’ was released by Bishop Stephen Chirappanath receiving it from Maju Peckal, the editor and granting it to the Zonal Secretary, Mr Johnson Chakkalakkal. Headmasters, Parish Committee members and the chaplains of the nine Holy Qurbana centres attended the meeting.

“Those who want to be good human beings, they should live for others and should lead a life joined with Christ” said Rev. Fr. 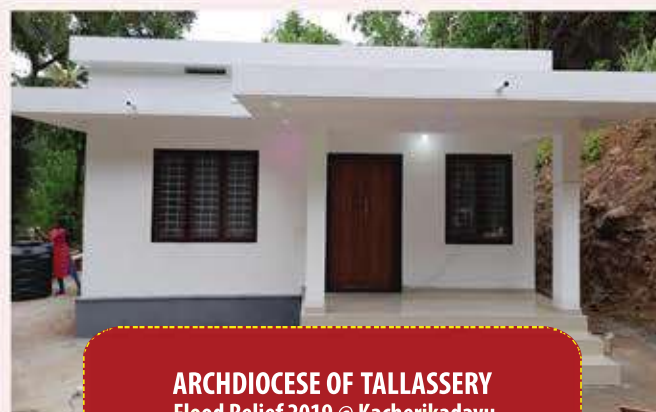

SMILE- (Syro Malabar Inclusive Life Experience) - A rationale

The catholic tradition considers every human life as equal and respects the dignity and values of life. Bishop Terry Brady- who is the chairman of the commission for Pastoral Life in the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference once suggested that 'Parish communities need every person to be part of the worshipping body. A Parish is not complete or whole unless it includes, nurtures, and rejoices in each of its members. Parishes are called to be communities that gladly and authentically welcome people with disability and their families to life of the Church'.

Syro Malabar Church in Ireland is following models of inclusion through our humble initiative named as SMILE- (Syro Malabar Inclusive Life Experience). At present there are several beneficiaries of SMILE programme, mostly families spread through various mass centers of the Syro Malabar Church in Ireland.

SMILE is a humble attempt where we develop inclusive programmes for the support of children and families with special needs. The main aim of the programme is to bring our specially gifted children and their families to the main stream of the church, where they could enjoy all the sacramental and ecclesial rights of the church.



SMILE has undertaken several inclusive adaptive Holy Masses for our specially gifted children and their families. It is envisaged to have a Holy Mass every month, but at the moment due to the nature of the pandemic restrictions, is facing challenges. There was a special Holy Mass and prayer session led by Fr. Xavier Khan Vattayil- director of Sehion Ministries during the time of our Annual Retreat 2019, where in our specially gifted children and their families were offered a Holy Mass and anointed personally.

SMILE has conducted an Occupational Therapy Awareness class in association with the Mathruvedi unit for the parents at Blanchardstown Mass centre during the start of 2020, which was apprised and accepted by the entire group.

SMILE offers advocacy, information on entitlements, individual sharing and mutual supports whenever required to its beneficiaries.

SMILE acts as an instrument for real inclusion in the Syro Malabar Church in Ireland. SMILE follows Pope Francis's words- "The way we experience illness and disability is an index of the love we are ready to offer".

Each and every one of us is created in the image of God. God's love is unconditional and he loves his creation in the state they are; with all their strengths and weaknesses. Christ has taught us liberation through his unconditional love and hope. Christ considered every individual as equal and unique.

We as the faithful in Syro Malabar Church are called for spreading the God's love in our day today dealings and while doing so, we require offering equal value and dignity to everyone, which includes our specially gifted children.

As the members of the church, everyone has a role in offering supports to our specially gifted members and their families. This role includes a translation of examples of inclusion set forward by Christ into practical actions and through this, contributions of each and every member, even if it is in little dimensions are acknowledged and respected. (For example- it takes a lot of effort for a specially gifted child to attend a catechism class. It takes long for a family to prepare their specially gifted child to attend a mass.) This is a joint responsibility as the baptismal rights of the individuals require to be respected and SMILE aims for this inclusion.

SYRO MALABAR CATHOLIC CHURCH IRELAND

Our aim: With the guidance of respective local ordinaries and suggestions of Apostolic Visitor, our aim is to form children and youth spiritually and socially with the genuine support of parents and the people of goodwill. We try our best to impart the faith we received upholding the rich spiritual, theological, liturgical and disciplinary patrimony of the Syro-Malabar Church.

History of Syro- Malabar Church in Ireland

The inception of the Syro-Malabar Church in Ireland began with the migration of its faithful to Ireland mainly from various districts of Kerala, India since the beginning of the year 2000. Initially there were very few families migrated to Ireland. Later due to the economic growth of Ireland during the period of 2002-2006 the demands for highly qualified health care professionals increased. Majority of the health care professionals recruited at that time were from Kerala which augmented the number of Syro-Malabar Catholic families by the year 2005. Between the years 2000-2005 Catholic priests who had come from Kerala for their higher studies catered the spiritual needs of the Syro-Malabar faithful in Ireland. Acknowledging the religious needs of the Syro-Malabar faithful (to hand over the glorious heritage of St. Thomas Christians to our children in this foreign country) Archbishop Most Rev. Diarmuid Martin of the Archdiocese of Dublin, welcomed the request of His Beatitude (late) Varkey Cardinal Vithayathil (Major Archbishop) to appoint two chaplains for the pastoral care of the Syro-Malabar faithful. That was the beginning of the Syro- Malabar Mission in Ireland. Considering the sizeable number of Syro-Malabar faithful communities residing in the Island of Ireland (Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland), the Syro-Malabar Bishops' Synod proposed to have a National Coordinator for the Syro-Malabar faithful in Ireland. Accordingly, the President of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of Ireland, appointed Msgr. Antony Perumayan as the National Coordinator for the Syro-Malabar Faithful in Ireland on 17th December 2013. An Apostolic Visitorator was appointed by the Holy See on 1 November 2016.

The Syro-Malabar Community in the Archdiocese of Dublin since 2005 have been submitting the audited accounts to the Archdiocese of Dublin. It ever remained a separate account. In such a situation for clarity, precision and transparency before the civil and ecclesial realm, there were detailed discussions between Syro-Malabar Officials and Financial experts of the Archdiocese of Dublin. "They have considered all aspects of the activities of the Syro-Malabar Community, both in Dublin and nationwide and have concluded that the appropriate governance structure is that the Community applies for its own registration with the Charities Regulatory Authority to cover the entire country." Based on the aforementioned Financial and legal experts' advice and direction, for the sake of financial administrative convenience, the SMC Dublin Zonal Coordination initiated the process of registration as charitable Trusts for the Syro-Malabar Church in Dublin and for other regions of Ireland namely Belfast, Cork and Galway and in general, also for the whole of Ireland.

In March 2020, Msgr. Dr. Antony Perumayan left his role as National Coordinator of Syro-Malabar Church in the Island of Ireland to resume his ministry in the home diocese of Ernakulam-Angamaly. At the instance, on 6th April 2020, Rev. Dr. Fr. Clement Padathiparambil, who is currently Finance officer of the National Coordination Council and the Coordinator of the Dublin Zonal Coordination Council, appointed as the National Coordinator of Syro-Malabar Church in the Island of Ireland.



PALLIYOGAM-PROCEDURE RULES: In order to coordinate and regulate the day today organization and administration of the Church activities under the National Coordinator, the PALLIYOGAM-PROCEDURE RULES promulgated in the Code of Particular Law of the Syro-Malabar Church (Mount St. Thomas, 2013) are adapted to the milieu of the Holy Qurbana Centres/Parishes in Ireland. Thereafter all the other existing Palliyogam Procedures followed are replaced with the new Procedure Rules viz., PALLIYOGAM OF THE SYRO-MALABAR MAJOR ARCHIEPISCOPAL CATHOLIC CHURCH IN THE ISLAND OF IRELAND by the order-Prot. No. 454/2016.

Coordination Councils: The National Coordination Council (Sabhayogham), The Regional Coordination Councils, The Holy Qurbana Centres' Committees, all collaborate together for the effective outcome of the pastoral ministry.

Qurbana Centres: Presently we have 41 Holy Qurbana centres in whole Ireland. Appreciatively remember all the priests and religious who have contributed to the growth of this vibrant Church and still contributing.

Pious Associations: Syro-Malabar Youth Movement, Mathruvedi, Pithruvedi (Vincent De Paul Society and different ministries of the church work together for the integral growth of this apostolic community.

The Catechism: Formal and Systematic faith formation takes place at the parish level. The Catechism classes are conducted mostly on Sundays so that the faith is imparted in the context of the celebration of the Day of the Lord namely the Sunday Holy Eucharist. The priests, the catechism teachers and the parish councils bear the prime responsibility for the catechetical formation of Children and young adults.

Safeguarding Children: The Syro-Malabar Catholic Church Ireland is committed to the implementation of respective local diocesan' Child Safeguarding Statement, policies, the practices and procedures that support our commitment to keeping children safe and secure while engaged in Church activities.

Garda Vetting: Garda vetting applications are submitted through the respective local diocese in the island of Ireland. The GNVB Affiliate registration number of the Syro-Malabar Church in Ireland is: GNVB/2011/NL29

GDPR: Syro Malabar Catholic Church Ireland complies with its obligations under the “GDPR” by keeping personal data up to date; by storing and destroying it securely; by not collecting or retaining excessive amounts of data; by protecting personal data from loss, misuse, unauthorised access and disclosure and by ensuring that appropriate technical measures are in place to protect personal data.

Parish Management System PMS : The Syromalabar Catholic Church Ireland is introducing an online ‘Athmastithi Kanakku’ for all members of the Syromalabar Church in Ireland. Every family has a unique login page for maintaining their information centrally. PMS provides unique Family Number for a family and Member Number for each member permanently based on a Parish. Syromalabar Church activities- Catechism, Retreat, Youth Movement, etc.,- are being controlled through this centralized software called PMS .It is a highly secure cloud system with inclusive backup recovery, upgrades and support and it’s URL link <https://smcpms.ie> is officially registered under the ownership of Syromalabar Catholic Church Ireland.

PMS Online Accounting Software: The Syro Malabar Catholic Church Ireland required an accounting solution that would meet their complex reporting needs whilst also providing a user-friendly system that parishes could easily adopt. This allowed a step-change away from paper, spreadsheet and book-keeping systems.

The Key Features:

- ✓ A highly secure cloud system with inclusive backup recovery, upgrades and support.
- ✓ Consolidation of all mass centres into a single reporting charity number was key which also facilitates a simplified internal and external auditing process.
- ✓ Financial Reports helps us to conduct a proper financial analysis of the Mass Centres.
- ✓ Facility to record VAT amount in order to submit claims under the VAT Compensation Scheme.
- ✓ A facility to integrate online payments into PMS Accounting software.

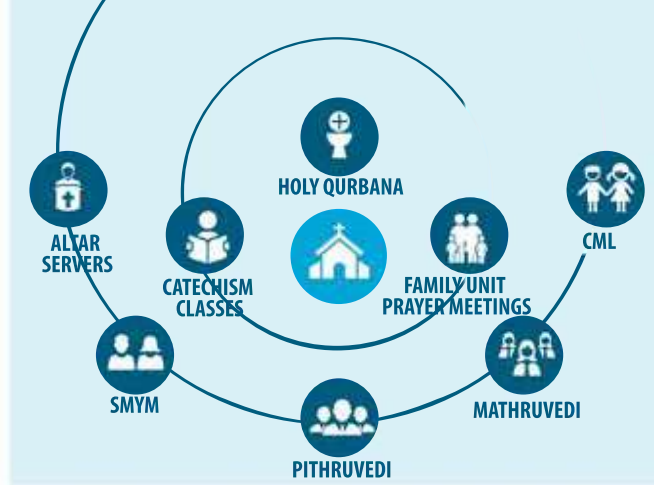

Mathruvedi was formally inaugurated by Bishop Rev. Dr. Stephen Chirappanath (Apostolic Visitor Europe) during May 2018 at Knock Basilica, Ireland.

During the year 2018- 2019, Mathruvedi units were formed and office bearers were appointed in all nine Mass Centres of Syro-Malabar Church in Dublin, Ireland.

SMCC National Coordinator, Dr. Fr. Clement Padathiparambil is the Director for Mathruvedi, Dublin. Mathruvedi units in each Mass Centre coordinate various activities in the Mass Centres and get involved in every aspects of church activities. An Executive group of all Mathruvedi representatives from individual Mass Centres were formed in 2020, aiming for organising various activities at the central level, in order to enable its members in the formation of families based on the Christian virtues and values. Mathruvedi was instrumental in organising an online “Marian Quiz” programme for all SMCC women from all over Ireland who are above 18 years. This Quiz Programme ran over a period of four consecutive Saturdays during October 2020 aimed at to impart knowledge about Mother Mary. Mathruvedi also initiated a new programme named “Akhanada Japamala” on 31st October, where women recited Chain Rosary at the Parish of Our Lady of Holy Rosary of Fathima, Rialto.

Mathruvedi made use of the benefits of technology during COVID-19 Pandemic to engage and offer soothing spirits to its members. Impossibilities were transformed to possibilities, with the effective use of technology and virtual meetings.

In preparation for the Feast of the Immaculate Conception of Mother Mary and celebration of Mathruvedi Day, a grand programme was conceptualized. “Maria Pulary” was a video streaming programme, wherein one representative from each Mass Centre created and posted video every morning from November 30th, until December 8th. CATECHISM

The Catechism department of the Syro-Malabar Church in Ireland is a response to the clarion call of Jesus Christ "Go to the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature" Mk. 16:15. Syro-Malabar Church founded by St. Thomas, the Apostle of Jesus in AD 52 tries its best to preserve the spiritual, theological, liturgical and disciplinary patrimony in the form of Catechism in various ways.

1. Family as the domestic Church initiates children to faith, traditions and customs at the very early stage.
2. Family units (Basic Ecclesial communities) in the mode of early Church (Prayer, Breaking of the Word, Breaking of the Bread and Communion) is another locus for prayer and fellowship.
3. Liturgy is the divine milieu where Christ's teaching is carried out through the Proclamation of the Word of God, prayers and hymns.
4. Sunday Catechism class is the best means to help the faithful to believe and practice the faith in Jesus the Son of God and to build up the mystical body of Christ i.e.; the Church.
5. Modern means of communication helps us to reach the people swiftly and personally. These are the astute ways we can preach the Gospel of joy to the youth and children.

The Syro-Malabar Church in Ireland has initiated number of activities for the good of the children, parents and teachers so that they may be enriched by the gifts of the Holy spirit and be enhanced in the love of Christ which surpasses all knowledge and may worship God the Father in truth and spirit.

Following are the activities we have done so far.

1. Regular Sunday Catechism classes in all the Mass Centres.
2. Special classes for children of class II for the preparation of Holy Communion.
3. Dublin Catechism Teachers' Convention.
4. All Ireland Catechism Teachers' Convention.
5. Holy Qurbana in English for Children.
6. Formation of Children's choir for Qurbana.
7. Gloria – 2020 – Elocution for children during Christmas.
8. "Biblia" – Bible Quiz competition for all the Mass Centres.
9. Bible Fest – a meeting of talents for Christian cultural expressions.
10. Catechism Teachers' special training program class wise.
11. Hagios – Audio visual program for children introducing saints.
12. Planning of Alpha Theology Course and classes on Catechism of the Catholic Church for teachers.
13. Special prize distribution for all those who have secured 1st, 2nd and 3rd positions for the exams conducted in all Mass Centres in Dublin.

Presently there are 192 catechism teachers in 11 Mass Centres and 1339 students in Dublin zone and 359 catechism teachers and 2093 students in whole Ireland guided by director, Rev. Fr. Roy Vattakattu with a very good catechism team in Dublin zone and for whole of Ireland.



A CONVENOR FOR SYRO-MALABAR COMBINED CATECHETICAL MISSION (SMCCM) OUTSIDE INDIA

The first meeting of the Combined Catechetical Mission was held on August 10 – 2020, an initiative to coordinate the Catechetical Ministries of the Syro-Malabar Church in the Eparchies and the Apostolic Visitations outside India by collaborating in all the realms possible to make the ministry more effective.

The Ireland Catechism department, and Mr. Pintu Jacob and Ms. Sibil Rose Sabu are assisting this new undertaking.

Syro-Malabar Youth Movement (SMYM) is the official youth movement of the Syro-Malabar Catholic Church globally. Although we have had movements like "Youth Ignite" in Dublin prior to the introduction of SMYM, the need for a movement with a global uniformity with the Syro-Malabar tradition led to the establishment of SMYM Dublin. Initiated through "Nuova Amicizia.", under the Directorship of Rev. Fr. Rajesh Mechirakath in December 2019, and duly supported by Rev. Dr. Fr. Clement Padathiparambil (National Co-ordinator) and Rev. Fr. Roy Vattakattu (Catechism Director), SMYM Dublin has over 400 members from the 9 Mass Centers in Dublin.

SMYM Dublin tries to live out its mission to lead all the youth of our community to follow the tradition and beliefs of the Syro-Malabar Catholic Church, and strives to bind them together as an integral part of the Church, and helps to develop them as future leaders/members of the Syro-Malabar Catholic Church. SMYM Dublin has actively organised various programs and activities aimed at the holistic development of youth, aligning its members with the religious and social causes of the Church. The programs designed by SMYM Dublin contribute to the development and growth of faith in its members, developing the leadership skills and enabling our youth to be future leaders of the church, encouraging them to pro-life, educating them on values of life and the Church's teachings by the use of social media, retreats, soft-skills training, counselling, participation in Holy Mass and inspiring them to support in Church activities which help in the personal development of the youth. The office bearers for the youth from among them is an ideal platform for them to harness their leadership skills and abilities under the able guidance and support of the Chaplains.

Few Highlights of SMYM Dublin Activities:

'Lead 1'

PITHRUVEDI



Pithruvedi is an association of male parents in the parishes of Syro-Malabar Church. The father in the family should enshrine the image of God the Father. He loves, cares and protects the members of the family.

In Syro-Malabar Church, the "Pithruvedi" has its own values and obligations. "Pithruvedi" envisions spiritual social and charitable activities of the community. The presence of its members in the parish celebrations is noteworthy. The Main Feasts celebrated are Feast of St. Joseph, the heavenly patron of this association, on every 19 March (Sadharam) during which all male parents and the name bearers of Joseph are specially remembered and honoured: St. Joseph's the Worker during which there is solemn blessing of the vehicles. The main goal of "Pithruvedi" is to equip the fathers of each family to be leaders of faith and morals and also conscientize the fathers about their duties as a responsible father to their children, a committed husband to his wife and caring son to his parents in the family. The lead for the charitable activities is mainly done by the members of Pithruvedi. From 8 December 2020 to 8 December 2021, Pope Francis has exhorted us to celebrate as the year of St. Joseph. May the values of St. Joseph inspire all the fathers of the family to lead a responsible life in the family and the society at large for the good of the community. Syro-Malabar Church plans to have three types of spiritual orientation this year namely, 1, Special prayers of St. Joseph on every Wednesdays (Ite ad Joseph) 2. Reflections on St. Joseph on every 19 of each month 3. Solemn celebrations on 19 March 2021, 1 May 2021 and 8 December 2021, if situations are conducive.

May the good Lord bless all the members of Pithruvedi with His choicest blessings.

Installation of the new Holy Qurbana Centre at Navan. The Feast of the Patroness & First Holy Communion



Navan Qurbana centre was officially inaugurated as a part of Syro-Malabar Church Dublin Region, in the name of Our Lady of Perpetual Succour. This Qurbana centre was instituted upon the request of the faithful of Syro-Malabar Church in the Trim and Navan area and with due consultation with Blanchardstown committee and zonal committee of Dublin and approval from Bishop Stephen Chirappanath. The official Qurbana Centre was inaugurated on 26th September 2020 Saturday at 10 am at Church of Nativity, Johnstown, Navan.

National Coordinator, Rev. Dr. Fr. Clement Padathiparambil inaugurated the session. Parish Chaplain and Priest in charge Rev. Fr. Roy Vattakatt, Rev. Fr. Rajesh Mechirakath, the SMYM Director, Rev. Fr. Paul and Rev. Fr. Shinto from the St. Paul's Society, Maynooth, Rev. Fr. George Augustin were present during the function. The Feast day of Our Lady of Perpetual Succour was celebrated on this auspicious occasion. The history of this Qurbana Centre starts with the family unit started by Rev. Fr. Jose Bharanikulangara for the Trim and Navan area. From 2015 onwards, Holy Qurbana was celebrated in Trim and later in 2017, the celebration of Holy Qurbana was changed to Navan, Johnstown Parish for the sake of convenience. In 2019 Rev. Fr. Roy Vattakattu became the official Priest in charge of Navan Family Unit. In September 2020, Catechism classes were started. About 40 families are present in this Qurbana Centre. Holy Qurbana is celebrated in this Qurbana Centre on every first and third Saturday at 10 am. Sunday Holy Qurbana will be started in the near future. Crystal Forbin John, Emil Reju, Kevin Emmanuel Jossy, Michael Xavier, Sarah Prince were the First Holy Communicants who received Jesus on the auspicious occasion of the installation of this Holy Qurbana centre.

MARTHOMĀ NĀZĀRĀNIS

Those who became the followers of the Way (Margam) of Jesus Christ through the Way (Margam) of St Thomas the Apostle (Mar Thoma Shliha) used to say to their children: "We are the children of St. Thomas the Apostle". Traditionally they were called Mar Thoma Nazranis. The name Nazranis is a very popular name for those who follow Jesus the Nazarene. In the pre-sixth century Syriac literature we find it, for example in the writings of St. Ephrem (c.306-373). It stood for Christians with a Judeo-Aramaic background.

'Syro'

Syro-Malabar is a prefix coined from the words Syriac as the church employs the East Syriac Rite Liturgy, and Malabar which is the historical name for modern Kerala, south west state of India. The Nasrani Qurbana used to be sung in the Suryani (Syriac) language. Until 1970s most of the churches followed Syriac Liturgy. Syriac is a form of Aramaic language, which Jesus spoke.

Holy Qurbana

The ritual service (liturgy) is called the Holy Qurbana, which is derived from the Hebrew Korban (קרבן), meaning "sacrifice".

Generally, footwear is removed before entering the church and women cover their heads during worship.

Saint Thomas Christians use terms like "Eeesho" (Jesus' name in Aramaic, "Yesu" (Hebrew name Yeshua) to denote Jesus Christ.

Church

The architecture of the early church reflected a blend of Jewish and Kerala styles. The "Holy of Holies" is divided by a red curtain for most of the time and is opened during the central part of the Qurbana.

Agape

Local native customs and cultural elements were harmoniously blended together with Christian faith. Agape of Apostolic times is kept up even today to some extent. Different food items (e.g. Food (nerchas) like razakanji, thamuku, kozhukkatta, kallappam, neyyappam, unniyappam, aval, kanji, rice, pachor, puzhuku, etc.), were offered and distributed in the Church. All are eager to participate in this kind of sacred meal in or around the Church in connection with worship. Both rich and poor, young and old offer and share this nercha agape. One tenth (tithe - passaram) of wealth was offered to the common needs of the Church.

Fasting

On fasting days of Lent and advent Nazranis used to take only a single meal after the evening prayers. All those who were staying near the Church came for evening and morning prayers. Some came even for the midnight prayers. Those who were far away made these three prayers at home. Even children were woken up for midnight prayers. Many pious Nazranis ate only a few pieces of "indari" and "kozhukatta" from Maundy Thursday (Pesaha) until the following Saturday evening. Many kept silent vigil during these days. Even children were to keep silence; if at all they speak only in a very small voice. Some used to sit in the Church (bhajanamirickal) on these days and other important days of fasting. There were some who did not eat anything for Three Days Lent. Fasting and abstinence on Fridays and Wednesdays (as prescribed in the first century work Didache) were a common apostolic practise among Nazranis. 50 Days Fast of Lent, 25 Days Fast of Advent, 50 Days Fast of the Apostles, 15 Days Fast before the Feast of Our Lady Of the Assumption, Fast of 12 Fridays after Christmas, 3 Days Fast of Ninevites, 8 Days Fast before the Feast of The Nativity Our Lady, Fast of the Virgins, Fast of Elijah, Fast of Transfiguration and other vigil fasts are an indication towards the intense ascetic orientation of Nazranis. Once we avoid overlapping days, the total fasting days come 225 per year! Fasting meant total abstinence from meat, fish, egg, milk and milk products, alcohol, sexual life, smoking, chewing betel, etc.

Rakuli Perunnal

In the middle of the night of Denha (Epiphany) all St Thomas Christians used to take a public bath in a nearby river or pond before entering the Church. This ritual bath is a reminder of the Baptism of Jesus in Jordan. On the same day at homes, they celebrated "pindikuthiperunnal". Oil lamps were arranged on the stem of plantain or banana trees and Nazranis went around it shouting repeatedly, EL PAYYA (meaning God is Light). In some places both these celebrations exist even today.

Pesaha Appam

St. Thomas Christians celebrate the Pesaha in a Christianized manner. On Maundy Thursday evening they "break the bread" and "drink milk". This unleavened bread is called "kurishappam". It is to be broken and distributed by the senior most male member of the family. Only Christians will be given a piece of this bread. So too they share a special thick drink made from coconut-milk. This bread and milk they make only for Pesaha. If a death has occurred in the family it will not make "kurishappam" that year. But relatives or neighbours bake two loaves of bread, one for themselves and the extra one for the family of the deceased.

Marriage

Marriages were well planned and arranged between two families according to their social, economic, cultural, educational, political status. Individuals were less important than the family and community. "Thalikettu" -A golden leaf (in shape of 'aalila') containing a cross made of twenty-one gold globes is the 'thali' of Nazrani bride. Three or seven threads are taken from 'manthrakodi' (bridal vestment) in order to form one thread to tie the 'thali' around the neck of the bride. As long as the married woman is alive, she will not part with the 'thali'. When she dies it is deposited in the coffer of the Church; often the portion with twenty-one crosses is broken for this offering in the Church. The thread and the 'kozha' (hole or handle) are buried with her. This symbolizes the sacredness and indissolubility of Nazrani marriage. Divorce and adultery were unheard of among traditional St. Thomas Christians. So too the evils like murder, alcoholism, theft, etc. were frowned upon.

Sacrament of Initiation

The sacraments of initiation (also called the "mysteries of initiation") are the three sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. As such, they are distinguished from the Sacraments of healing (Anointing of the sick and Sacrament of Penance) and from the Sacraments of Service (Marriage and Ordination).

In the Eastern Church all three sacraments are usually administered at the same time, even in the case of infants.

As we know at least one of the family members of the Syro-Malabar Migrants in Ireland is working in the health care sector. Many of the sons and daughters of our Church contracted disease during their tedious service in the hospitals and care homes. There were instances in which they had to work alone without anybody's support and expecting all the probability of catching of this contagion. They were quite aware that these days which had to be endured without company of friends and relatives. Anxiety of the beloved ones in the native places really haunted them. The death of the dearest and nearest ones, unable to see their faces for the last time: Helplessness to attend the needs of the beloved ones in their agony; anxiety and concerns of the job; despair of those who lost job; the students who had to be in the fearful solitude; inability to attend the liturgical ceremonies; all created an atmosphere of pessimism and gloom.

But there were lot of positive things done by the Syro-Malabar Church for the People of God during these crucial times especially in giving spiritual support for the suffering minds. When most of the churches were closed during the pandemic, there were daily Holy Masses celebrated at Rialto Parish which could be viewed through online. We could participate in the prayers led by His Holiness Pope Francis, the head of the Universal Church and His Beatitude Mar George Cardinal Alencherry, the father and the head of the Syro-Malabar Church. When the restrictions of the lock down were reduced, the number of Holy Masses offered were increased to facilitate the sacred wishes and the holy desires of the people of God. The Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, Adoration, Benediction and Rosary gave divine courage to the desperate ones. Very effective programs were conducted through online for the children to motivate and inspire them. The online catechism classes are still continuing. Thankfully remembering the Rialto Parish Priest, Rev. Fr. Fergal Mac Donough and Sacristan Respected Robert Allen; they both deserve our sincere appreciation.

Though those planned activities like Pilgrimage to Holy Land, Pilgrimage to Eternal City, Pleroma Zonal Competitions, Lenten Retreat, Familia Fest, Bible Fest, and Catechism Exams could not be realized due to this unforeseen situation, let us hopefully and prayerfully wait for the days to come and if God wills, we shall execute the activities of our Church in a more profound way and with deep enthusiasm.

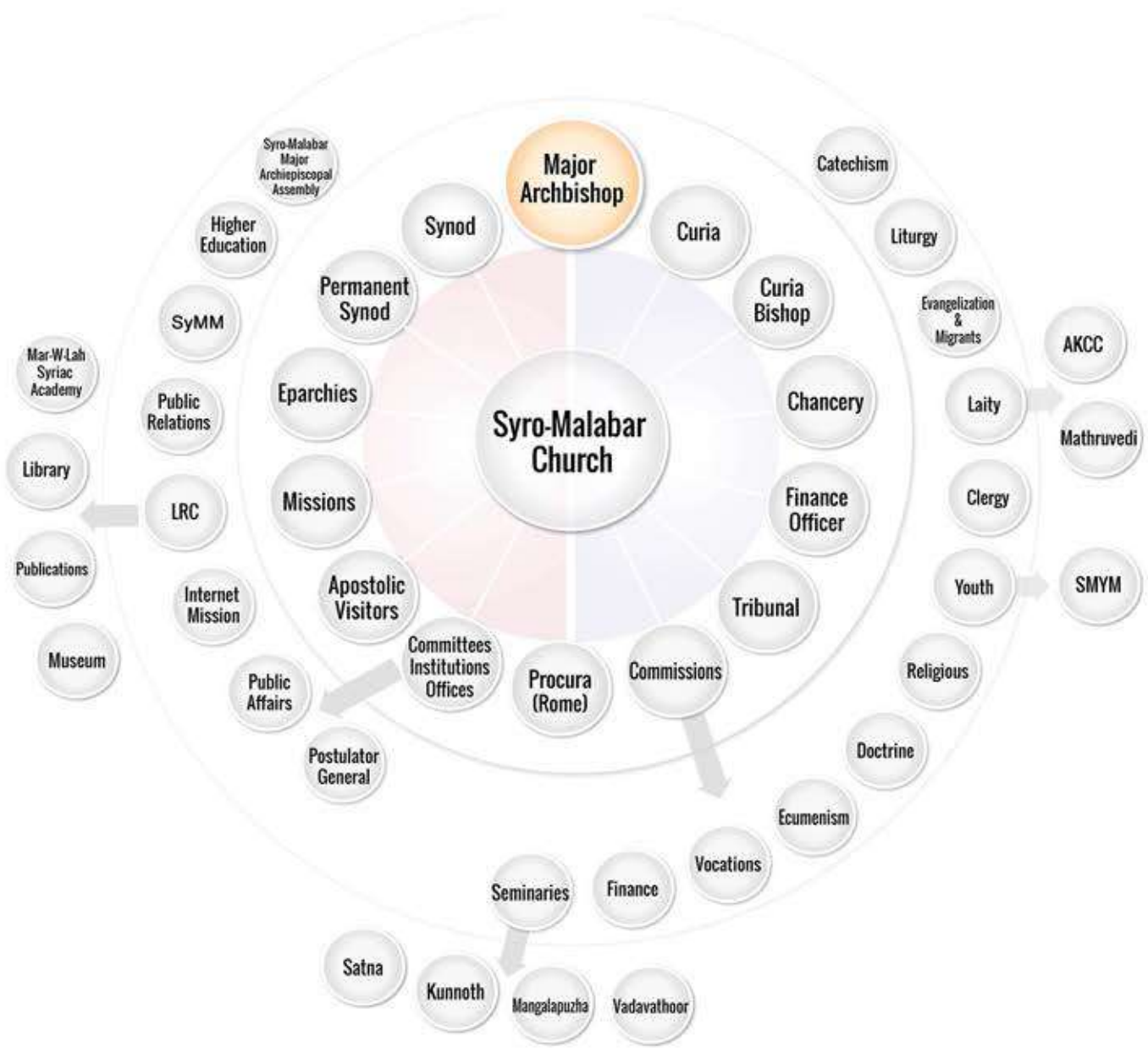


Season of Corona

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Syro Malabar Liturgical Calendar

Patriarch Ishoyabb III gave the final form of the liturgical calendar in the seventh century AD. The Cathedral Liturgical order and Monastic Liturgical Order that existed before were harmonized by him to make this new liturgical ordo. In Latin Rite we predominantly use the Sanctoral Cycle whereas in Syro-Malabar Church we have the Temporal Cycle i.e. liturgical year planned according to the seasons. According to this form the liturgical year is the unveiling of the salvific work which starts with the incarnation of Misiha (Jesus the anointed) and ends with the heavenly entry of the Church. The seasons of the liturgical year is based on the seven-week principle. The different liturgical seasons are as follows:
